An outstanding record in winning in all categories of shuffleboard brings this coveted award close to such a player. However, many other attributes are needed to actually grasp it.

Clean sportsmanship is essential; being popular among all players adds luster to potential claimant.

A Florida State Association President automatically earns this high honor after having given his all to outstanding leadership and devotion to his many obligations.

A person may posthumously be given this Hall of Fame remembrance for having been recognized for sacrificing his personal affairs in order to help shuffleboard progress and prosper.

Then, there are a few who are so devoted to the game and to its betterment that they are acclaimed while alive with the Special Award, struck just for them.

If you know such people as described above, it is your duty to contact your District President and begin to accumulate a dossier of his merits, which will be presented to the Florida State Association Executive Committee, showing this person's right to such recognition.
