The game must have its time limit, either in minutes or frames, to compete with other sports on radio, T.V. or attendance participation.

For the past three years, I have played all games in my district with 75 points or 16 frames, whichever comes first, with no complaints. During that period only three or four games ever reached 16 frames.

Any tournament director also knows that this method keeps the charts balanced and does not force contestants to stay over an extra day with the added expense and discomfort. It also prevents angry outbursts and grumbling.

Let us start to properly support our experts and give their skill adequate cash support.

At present our referees are negligent and careless of their duties on the courts, and they create needless discord during play.

To overcome this deficiency the Central East Coast District has appointed a referee instructor who trains referees; also giving them a written examination and court demonstration before qualifying them for a referee card.
